Week Commencing: 17th March, Passion Sunday

This week we have a 10.00am Parish Communion, with an activity available for children. All are welcome to worship. At 6.00pm we will be walking the Stations of the Cross, in church. This service will also be zoomed - use the Sunday morning link. Don't forget our last Lent lunch, around midday, on Sunday. Everyone is welcome.

The Collect

Most merciful God, who by the death and resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ delivered and saved the world: grant that by faith in him who suffered on the cross we may triumph in the power of his victory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion Prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, you have taught us that what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters we do also for you: give us the will to be the servant of others as you were the servant of all, and gave up your life and died for us, but are alive and reign, now and for ever.

First Reading

³¹The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ³²It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt – a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. ³³But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the LORD', for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Gospel Reading

²⁰Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. ²¹They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.' ²²Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. ²³Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. ²⁴Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. ²⁵Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. ²⁶Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour. ²⁷'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say – "Father, save me from this hour"? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. ²⁸Father, glorify your name.' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' ²⁹The crowd standing there heard it and said that

it was thunder. Others said, 'An angel has spoken to him.' ³⁰Jesus answered, 'This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. ³¹Now is the judgement of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. ³²And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself.' ³³He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die. *John 12.20-33*

Thought for the week:

My funeral plan (which I am rather hoping won't be needed just yet!) states that there is to be a bowl of wheat next to my coffin. This follows a custom found in the Orthodox church – the wheat symbolising dying in order to gain new, full, life, and drawing on part of Jesus' teaching in Sunday's gospel: '...unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies it remains just a single grain, but if it dies, it bears much fruit'.



This saying of Jesus is at heart of gospel – it is what he is about - he lives (and dies) the message and expects his disciples (us) to do the same. It is the principle of life through death.

That grain of wheat is ineffective as long as it is preserved, it must be thrown into the cold dark ground and die in order to do good, to grow and flourish. In the same way, Jesus calls his disciples to put to death personal desire and ambition in order to grow to new life.

As we travel through Lent we might ask ourselves, are we prepared to die to our own desires and needs for sake and good of others? To what is God calling each of us, both individually and corporately, in His service?

Prayer suggestions for this week:

- That all may know themselves loved by God
- For a holy Passiontide
- For those who are living on the breadline and on our streets, for shelter and support
- For the people of Israel and Palestine, for an end to the violence there and for strength for all those who are suffering loss and fear. For our sisters and brothers in the Jewish and Muslim communities of our own town, and for all who are keeping Ramadan.
- For a de-escalation of the situation in the Middle East.
- For peace in Ukraine and Russia, and of Sudan, and also in Armenia and Ethiopia.
- For our ministry with children and families.
- For a new church music leader.
- For our growth in faith and for the Alpha team and guests.
