#### **The Collect**

Almighty God,
whose Son Jesus Christ
is the resurrection and the life:
raise us, who trust in him,
from the death of sin
to the life of righteousness,
that we may seek those things which are above,
where he reigns with you
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

#### **Post Communion Prayer**

Merciful Father, you gave your Son Jesus Christ to be the good shepherd, and in his love for us to lay down his life and rise again: keep us always under his protection, and give us grace to follow in his steps; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

#### **First Reading**

36In Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. 37At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. 38Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, 'Please come to us without delay.' 39So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. 40Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, 'Tabitha, get up.' Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. 41He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. 42This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. 43Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

#### **Gospel Reading**

22At that time the festival of the Dedication took place in Jerusalem. It was winter, 23and Jesus was walking in the temple, in the portico of Solomon. 24So the Jews gathered around him and said to him, 'How long will you keep us in suspense? If you are the Messiah, tell us plainly.' 25Jesus answered, 'I have told you, and you do not believe. The works that I do in my Father's name testify to me; 26but you do not believe, because you do not belong to my sheep. 27My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. 28I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand. 29What my Father has given me is greater than all else, and no one can snatch it out of the Father's hand. 30The Father and I are one.'

#### Thought for the week:

Sunday is known as Good Shepherd Sunday when the gospel treading reminds us of Jesus the Good Shepherd. A powerful image, one of the oldest known paintings of Jesus depicts him as the Good Shepherd. Shepherds at the time of Jesus tended their flocks with great care – their sheep were everything – their food and clothing and livelihood. They may even have been breeding sheep for temple sacrifices.



At night they herded the flock into the pen, separating our sheep and goats, if necessary, and then the shepherd laid down in the opening, forming a human gate to protect their beloved flock. They fought off wolves and thieves. They knew each one of their sheep – perhaps by number or even by nickname – black socks, loppy, pinkeye...

These 'good' shepherds cared for their flocks completely – their animals were an extension of themselves – a bit like our domestic dogs or cats today.

And the flocks knew their own shepherd's voice, his particular call. They knew their whistles, the sound of their own shepherds flute. The flock knew that they were safe with their shepherd. Flock and shepherd loved in a mutual bond of dependency and trust. They were bound to each other. As Jesus' disciples today we are both sheep AND shepherds. We too have been changed by the Good Shepherd and called to follow his example, to feed his sheep. We are called to ministry as individuals and as church, to participate in the work of God. To see what God is doing in the world, and to join in.

Sunday is also vocations Sunday when the church focusses particularly on encouraging people to hear God's call to ordained and licensed ministry but it is also a good time for all of us to consider afresh what tune the Good Shepherd is playing for each of us. Through formal ministry perhaps (don't shut that idea out) or maybe by working as a Street Pastor, arranging flowers in church, helping Foodshare, serving as PCC secretary, becoming a teacher, TA, carer... God's list is endless, his flock is huge and diverse.

To what is the Good Shepherd calling you?

#### Revd. Sally's final services...

Revd. Sally leaves the parish at the end of July. She would like the final Eucharist on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> to be a time for current church family and invites us to the vicarage garden for a bring and share picnic afterwards.

Everyone is warmly invited to a **Thanksgiving service on Sunday 20**<sup>th</sup> **July at 3pm in church.** This will be a simple service of Evening Prayer and will be followed by afternoon tea. A number of other guests will also be invited, recognising those wider links that Sally has developed during her time here. To assist with catering and places please book your place by signing up on the list in church.

#### ... and the vacancy process...

- The vacancy start date is not triggered until at least Revd. Sally's formal retirement date (7<sup>th</sup> August).
- A number of people will support the parish and be involved in the process of appointment of anew vicar: Bishop Mary, the Archdeacon, Area Dean and Rhodri Bowen, our Area Parish Development Adviser. Rhodri joined us for our PCC planning morning recently.
- It will be important to make space for prayer and discernment, and to keep in touch with other 'agencies' such as our school and WAMCF.
- It may be 9-12 months before a new vicar is appointed. In this time the vicarage will likely be let for 6 months (this is an important source of diocesan income).
- The process starts with a meeting of the PCC with the Archdeacon called a Section 11 meeting. There are some legal things that must be done and most importantly the PCC elects two parish reps who will work with the diocesan officers on selecting a new vicar. Usually this is the churchwardens.
- It is really important that the reps and PCC listen to what all stakeholders have to say about where they feel God is leading the church for the future.
- After the Section 11 meeting and the listening, then the PCC (led by the wardens /reps) will draw up a Parish Profile which is a summary of the life and worship of the church and its wider parish. These days this is usually a powerpoint document that can be read online.
- When the Profile is ready the Archdeacon will hold a Section 12 meeting and invite the PCC, at which the Profile will be accepted and the advert and interview process will be agreed.

The 8.00 Holy Communion service will continue to be monthly, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday.

Midweek Holy Communion is at 10 am weekly, followed by coffee

Baby and Toddler group meets on Thursdays, 9.30 – 11.00 am term time only. We meet in church.

Messy Church continues on the first (usually) Friday, monthly, 4-5.30pm. Next is 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2025
