The Collect

God our redeemer,

you have delivered us from the power of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of your Son: grant, that as by his death he has recalled us to life, so by his continual presence in us he may raise us to eternal joy;

through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord.

Post Communion

God our Father, whose Son Jesus Christ gives the water of eternal life: may we thirst for you, the spring of life and source of goodness, through him who is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

Readings for Sunday

²²Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, 'Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. ²³For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, "To an unknown god." What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. ²⁴The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, ²⁵nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. ²⁶From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, ²⁷so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him - though indeed he is not far from each one of us. ²⁸For "In him we live and move and have our being"; as even some of your own poets have said, "For we too are his offspring."

²⁹Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. ³⁰While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, ³¹because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.' *Acts 17.22-31*

The Gospel reading

Jesus said to his disciples: ¹⁵'If you love me, you will keep my commandments. ¹⁶And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you for ever. ¹⁷This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you. ¹⁸I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. ¹⁹In a

little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. ²⁰On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. ²¹They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them.' *John 14. 15-21*

Thought for the week

'I will not leave you orphaned'.

Jesus chose his last words to his friends very carefully. He had grasped why they needed this promise. He got just how they would feel once he was gone – no one to look to, to take advice (and orders) from, no one to speak up for them and get them out of the mess that had gotten themselves into.

Jesus was, is, 'very God, very man' – as human he knew just what his friends needed – especially if they were to continue his work and to build God's kingdom and if they were to have real hope for the future. As God, he could supply that deep need.

But Jesus knew that they needed more than words to reassure them – they needed the real practical help and



comfort that all humans have needed – in all time – and so he promised them 'another advocate'. It is easy to miss out that word, 'another' when we think of the Holy Spirit as advocate. Jesus himself has been their advocate – defending them and guiding them up to the point of his arrest. He promises to send ANOTHER – a being who will be there for them and do all the parent / leader things that Jesus has done - and even more because the new advocate will not be limited by time and space as he has been but will be truly omniscient – and able to support all people at all time.

As we prepare to celebrate Pentecost in two weeks, we remember that we have Jesus' Spirit with us in power and essence. The whole Trinity is accessible to us through God's grace and through their mutual relationship. We simply have to trust Jesus' words and we have him with us for all time. Once we have accepted that, then we must share that amazing news with others too.

From the PCC

Key issues discussed at the recent PCC meeting:

- Officers were elected: Vice Chair Jacqueline Lewis; Treasurer Bev Botting; Secretary Jeanette Lock; Health and Safety Off8cer – Simon Bader; Parish Safeguarding Officer – Barbara Essam; Electoral Roll – via the Parish Office; Standing committee reps – Anne Child and Ralph Hinchliffe.
- Deanery Synods rep confirmed as: Ruth Sheppard, Marc Capporiccio, Jeanette Lock
- The three main charities for this year were agreed as: local Foodshare (Katty King to champion) National Green Christians (Kim Rumble to champion) International rebuilding after the Turkish/ Syrian earthquake (via Embrace the middle East, Barbara Essam to champion)
- Fabric team is exploring three key areas: lighting, boiler replacement and churchyard
- The Institute for Children Youth and Mission is supporting our search for a Children and Family leader
- Andrew Gallacher will give the inaugural Johanna Raffan memorial recital on Sunday 8th October at 3pm.
- A nurture programme will start this month (see this sheet)
- An anonymous donor was thanked for paying for the church to be deep cleaned, we need to find more cleaners to join the regular team.
- On finance, the church currently had an overspend of £32,115.99, largely due to boiler repair work along with the considerable rising energy costs. While it was hoped that planned giving and church collections for 2023 would match that from 2022, there would still be a need to raise additional money. (see bellow).
- A Garden party will be arranged for early autumn (Sunday 3rd September) and a 'Not the summer fair' collection will, be held on 23rd July.
- The PCC plans to install a defibrillator.

• It was noted that the Headteacher of St. Luke's School, will be leaving this summer.
