The Collect

Merciful God,
you have prepared for those who love you
such good things as pass our understanding:
pour into our hearts such love toward you
that we, loving you in all things
and above all things,
may obtain your promises,
which exceed all that we can desire;
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Post Communion

God of our pilgrimage, you have led us to the living water: refresh and sustain us as we go forward on our journey, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading

¹There is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. ²For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. ³For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, ⁴so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. ⁵For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. ⁶To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. ⁷For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh cannot please God.

⁹But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. ¹⁰But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. ¹¹If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus

from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

Gospel Reading

¹Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the lake. ²Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. ³And he told them many things in parables, saying: 'Listen! A sower went out to sow. ⁴And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. ⁵Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. ⁶But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. ⁷Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. ⁸Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. ⁹Let anyone with ears listen!

¹⁸Hear then the parable of the sower. ¹⁹When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. ²⁰As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; ²¹yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. ²²As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. ²³But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty.'

Thought for the week

All of the photos in this week's sheet were taken in May 2009 as I walked down the Mount of Beatitudes towards the Sea of Galilee. It was a hot and breezy late morning (yes, a foolish time to be walking in the heat!) and the winding path down the steep slope took me through 'fields' of crops almost ripe and ready for harvest on the hillside. They looked to be oats and wheat, alongside bananas at the top of the slope.

As I made my slow descent, I couldn't help feeling that I was walking right through Jesus' parable of the sower.





The path that I walked on was rough and pebbly, compacted and harsh. Some seed had clearly been spilt there last autumn and gobbled up by the birds that even now were circling overhead. There were indeed thistles growing in places and weeds that choked the crops and although beautiful in themselves would not please the farmer. It was so hot any crops not in sufficient depth of soil would wither.

And there were patches of good ripe crops that would keep the farms safely in livelihood for the coming year.

So little had changed in 2000 years.

And that is true too of people – whose hearts have changed little in 2000 years too.

This parable is one of very few for which Jesus explains the meaning. He speaks about commitment to faith and to growth

through nurture and good deep roots that drink in Bible teaching and which are nourished by the warmth of God's love, avoiding distractions and pressures from the world.

We all live under huge pressures today but by going deeper into our faith and resting in God, we can truly flourish and live life to the full, as God desires for each of us.

Recycling at St Luke's

As one of the ways to demonstrate our commitment to living more sustainably and caring for creation, we have set up an area at the back of church by the servery, where things that can be difficult to recycle at home can be brought and members of the 'eco-team' will ensure they are taken to be recycled correctly.

There are two boxes:

- One for used pill packets
- One for dead batteries and empty make up containers.

There is a larger 'hamper' for packaging that can be recycled in supermarkets. This rubbish has this label



Recycle with bags at large supermarkets | Don't recycle at home

You can see this label on plastic wrapping such as bread bags, fruit and veg bags, crisp packets and chocolate wrappers. You can recycle this type of packaging at recycling points in selected supermarkets.

Please do bring any of these items of rubbish and place them in the appropriate container. Many people making small changes in the end makes a big difference.

From the PCC

Key points discussed at the recent PCC meeting:

- The bench in memory of John Cox is now in place in the churchyard
- An independent energy consultancy firm is to be engaged to undertake an audit of our future heat and light needs in order to inform planning for a new boiler and lighting system
- It is hoped to employ someone to clean the church (basic) fortnightly, alongside volunteer

cleaners

- £200 had been received for the flower fund from a funeral donation
- Permission has been given for a defibrillator outside the church, Thames Valley Heart Beat will supply it and we will seek funding from W&MCT towards the cabinet, we are responsible for upkeep
- To ensure safety and safeguarding, the dates for the Tree Festival will now be: Wednesday 6th December set up day, Thursday 7th: Schools day (no public) Friday 8th Sunday 10th open to the public.
- Our financial situation is much as it was this time last year, EXCEPT that fuel bills are almost three times increased. We need address this by increased giving and other means.
- It was agreed that we should change our inspecting architect for one who is conservation accredited.
- The bronze Eco Church award has been applied for (thanks for Phyl and the Eco team)
- The key priorities on our current Mission Action Plan have been identified as:
 - Nurture of existing and new members/welcome and support (inclusive church/contactors)
 - o Sustainability: churchyard/lights and boiler/teaching and encouragement.
- Four working parties have been set up. each member of the PCC is on one and members of the congregation will be invited to join too:
 - Heat and Light-led by Clare
 - Churchyard-led by Simon
 - o Nurture and Invitation-led by Revd. Sally
 - o Eco-Church-led by Revd. Phyl
- The Complaints and Recruitment policies were reviewed
- A new headteacher has been appointed for St. Luke's school for January.
