The Collect

Almighty God, whose only Son has opened for us a new and living way into your presence: give us pure hearts and steadfast wills to worship you in spirit and in truth; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion Prayer

Lord God, the source of truth and love, keep us faithful to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, united in prayer and the breaking of bread, and one in joy and simplicity of heart, in Jesus Christ our Lord.

Gospel Reading

¹When the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus, ²they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. ³(For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; ⁴and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.) ⁵So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?' ⁶He said to them, 'Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written,

"This people honours me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; ⁷in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines."

¹⁴Then he called the crowd again and said to them, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand: ¹⁵there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile.' ²¹For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, ²²adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. ²³All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person.' *Mark 7.1-8, 14-15, 21-23*

Thought for the week...

Today's gospel reading is not an easy one. Jesus is criticised for not keeping the 'traditions of the elders' – that meant respecting food laws and ritual washing and so on. But Jesus points out that it is not what goes into us that causes problems- rather what comes out of us. People can appear pious and holy externally but just what is going on inside?

Autumn is upon us. A new school year always seems to herald the start of more 'stuff' – of busyness starting again. The quietness of summer ceases and more demands are made of us, even those who no school links at all.

It is so easy to get swept up with it all – as individuals, family, church. We become like swans, to stretch the analogy a little - apparently serene on the outside but paddling madly inside.

Perhaps the concept of silence leading to inner stillness might attract us this autumn and we might each learn to be quick to listen and slow to speak, to be still with God allowing Him to calm our inner selves so that what 'comes out of us' is gentle, uplifting, loving and kind.

Then author Henri Nouwen writes: 'the Word of God [Jesus] is born out of the eternal silence of God, and it to this Word out of silence that we want to be witnesses'.

As we move into the 'stuff' of autumn, I wonder whether seeking that inner silence might enable us to live more effectively as disciples of Jesus.

Administration of Holy Communion

As was announced in church recently, we have received a letter from the Bishop informing churches that the practice of intinction at communion (dipping the wafer into the wine) that became widespread as a result of the pandemic should now stop. Bishop Olivia writes, that intinction...

... should only ever be an exceptional practice. The sharing of the common cup is one of the foundation stones of Anglican sacramental practice, dating back to Cranmer's Prayer Book and part of our heritage, and which in normal times should be normal practice.

She continues:

... no one needs to drink from the chalice if they do not feel comfortable doing this, as receiving the bread alone is sufficient to receive the Sacrament. But for those who do wish to receive the wine, the common cup is there. Drinking from a silver vessel is extremely safe as germs do not survive contact with the metal for long and the chalice is always wiped.

From THIS SUNDAY we will therefore cease to offer intincted wafers (except at home communion) and will revert to, usually, having to chalices and two ciboria. This will be at all services.

Looking ahead to this Autumn:

The Thanksgiving service for the life of Phyllis Sigsworth, RIP, will be held in church on Sunday 8th September at 2pm. All are warmly invited to give thanks for this amazing lady, who played a key role in the life of our church family for so many years. We hope that parking will be available at St. Joseph's church from 1.30 pm (NOT before this) and will confirm that next week. There is parking also on nearby streets and on Norfolk Road itself on Sundays.

Heritage weekend: Friday 13th **and Saturday 14**th **September.** We are participating in this national event by opening the church for people to visit and see our rich Christian heritage through our architecture and history. The current 'living stones' of the church will also be evident through other activities going on concurrently.

The church will be open from 10 am - 4 pm each day, with guided tours available 10 am - 1 pm and 3 pm - 4 pm. If you are able to give some time to help guide please let Ann Darracott know asap (information will be provided).
