Week Commencing: 20th April, Easter Sunday

As we come to celebrate the resurrection this Sunday we have a Dawn service at 6am in Kidwells Park, followed by breakfast in church. At 8am we have Holy Communion with the lighting of the Paschal Candle. Then at 10am we have Festal Holy Communion with the blessing of our Easter Garden. Everyone is warmly invited to worship with us.

BUT please do not wait until Sunday to join us in prayer. On Maundy Thursday we begin to keep the Triduum – one service which lasts for three days. We need to be a part of the whole to grasp the enormity of what Jesus did for us.

At 8pm on Maundy Thursday we gather to remember Jesus' last meal on earth (we will start with coffee and snacks to symbolise that, and then leave the debris as we move into the service and Watch). There is then no Blessing, no end to that service, until Easter Day.

On Friday there are three acts of worship to join in – one, two or all. The Walk of Witness, Reflections at the Cross and the Liturgy of the Last Hour. We need to be with Jesus at his death if we are to celebrate his resurrection.

Do come along to all that you can.

The Collect for Easter Sunday

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise and honour, glory and might, now and in all eternity.

Post Communion Prayer

God of Life,
who for our redemption
gave your only-begotten Son
to the death of the cross,
and by his glorious resurrection
have delivered us from
the power of our enemy:
grant us so to die daily to sin,
that we may evermore live with him
in the joy of his risen life;
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading

³⁴Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius. 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. ³⁷That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁸how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he

went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴²He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.' *Acts 10. 34-43*

Gospel Reading

¹On the first day of the week, at early dawn, the women who had accompanied Jesus came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. ²They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, ³but when they went in they did not find the body. ⁴While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. ⁵The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground but the men said to them, 'Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. ⁶Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, 7that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again.' 8Then they remembered Jesus' words, 9and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. ¹⁰Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. ¹¹But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. ¹²But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened. *Luke 24. 1-12*
