#### The Collect

O God, you declare your almighty power most chiefly in showing mercy and pity: mercifully grant to us such a measure of your grace, that we, running the way of your commandments, may receive your gracious promises, and be made partakers of your heavenly treasure; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

we your faithful people
have celebrated that one true sacrifice
which takes away our sins
and brings pardon and peace:
by our communion
keep us firm on the foundation of the gospel

## **First Reading**

<sup>1</sup>I ask, then, has God rejected his people? By no means! I myself am an Israelite, a descendant of Abraham, a member of the tribe of Benjamin. <sup>2</sup>God has not rejected his people whom he foreknew. <sup>29</sup>For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable. <sup>30</sup>Just as you were once disobedient to God but have now received mercy because of their disobedience, <sup>31</sup>so they have now been disobedient in order that, by the mercy shown to you, they too may now receive mercy. <sup>32</sup>For God has imprisoned all in disobedience so that he may be merciful to all. *Rom. 11.1-2a, 29-32* 

## **Gospel Reading**

<sup>21</sup>Jesus went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. <sup>22</sup>A Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, 'Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon.' <sup>23</sup>But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, 'Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us.' <sup>24</sup>He answered, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel.' <sup>25</sup>But she came and knelt before him, saying, 'Lord, help me.' <sup>26</sup>He answered, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' <sup>27</sup>She said, 'Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table.' <sup>28</sup>Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish.' And her daughter was healed instantly. *Matthew 15.21-28*

## Thought for the week:

Today's gospel offers an insight that proved initially unpopular with his followers. Jesus was in non - Jewish territory (perhaps travelling between places). But his reputation of course had spread and a local woman — a non- Jew — followed him calling out for help for her daughter. What people then thought of a demon possession was probably what we today call epilepsy.

She really wound the disciples up by her calling out and they asked Jesus to get rid of her. We don't know whether Jesus' answer is designed for her to hear or not – but she does – and she responds. Jesus said that he had come only to the Jews, and even when she



knelt at his feet and pleaded what he told her suggested that he had limited resources, he could only help his own — 'it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs' (that's quite a rebuff and pretty rude — dogs was the slang term then for Gentiles). But the woman's persistence led to a revelation for both Jesus and his followers and to the start of a more open community of faith. She answered, 'yes, Lord, but even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table'. Even those on the edges, those excluded, she said, could hear and believe. Her faith led Jesus to heal her daughter. And it surely contributed to a wider membership of the embryonic church — a revelation and concept which was hard for some people to grasp at first.

Today the church is open to all people – all races and backgrounds. We pride ourselves at St. Luke's on being an inclusive church. But I wonder just how true that really is. We are so used to being in church and part of the church that I think we forget how difficult it is for those outside to come in and become a full part. Yet that does not mean that there is not a spiritual desire to be a part: 'even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table'.
