The Collect

O God, the strength of all those who put their trust in you, mercifully accept our prayers and, because through the weakness of our mortal nature we can do no good thing without you, grant us the help of your grace, that in the keeping of your commandments we may please you both in will and deed; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Eternal Father,
we thank you for nourishing us
with these heavenly gifts:
may our communion strengthen us in faith,
build us up in hope,
and make us grow in love;
for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading

23Before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed. 24Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith. 25But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian, 26for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. 27As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ; 28There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. 29And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise.

Galatians 3. 23-end

Gospel Reading

 26 Jesus and his disciples arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. 27 As he stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. 28 When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, 'What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me' - 29 for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) 30 Jesus then asked him, 'What is your name?' He said, 'Legion'; for many demons had entered him. 31 They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss.

³²Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. ³³Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned.

³⁴When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. ³⁵Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. ³⁶Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. ³⁷Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. ³⁸The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, ³⁹'Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you.' So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him. *Luke 8. 26-39*

Thought for the week:

Paul's words in the letter to the Galatians that we read this coming Sunday (see right) are poignant and reflect where we as a church choose to 'come from' as Christians and people of faith. We believe that God came to earth in the person of Jesus to show all people that the matter — whoever they are, whatever they are, wherever they are. That is a really powerful concept in an age of choice and privilege. Jesus, and those who followed him, did away with the traditional norms of cliques and the 'ins and outs'. The gospel reading for Sunday shows him

There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.

Galatians 3:28

healing a man who was not of Jewish origin – a 'foreigner' – who spread the word about him in that area too.

The first followers of Jesus lived in an age of identity. There was strict and clear separation between people, especially religious groups such as Pharisees, Sadducees, Scribes, lay people and so on. And beyond Judaism, Jew and Gentile were clearly defined. Yet in the Gospel story Jesus crosses to other side of lake, a Gentile area, where the Romans were keeping and eating pigs – anathema to Jews.

And gender was also clearly defined – women had little public say, children were possessions and treated as inferior – and so of course were servants and slaves – and there was a difference between those two groups.

In Galatians, Paul who cuts deep into the old teaching, belief and modus operandi:

He makes the point that in Christ ALL people are the same – clearly people look different, they have different gifts and backgrounds but the basic identity of all people is IN Jesus - that is the bottom line – in Jesus all are one and the same. All human. All loved. All special.

And that impacts in self confidence too.

At St. Luke's our rainbow mugs remind us of this every time we drink tea or coffee. Let us celebrate our unity in diversity!
