The Collect

Almighty God,

you have created the heavens and the earth and made us in your own image: teach us to discern your hand in all your works and your likeness in all your children; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit reigns supreme over all things, now and for ever.

Post Communion Prayer

God our creator, by your gift the tree of life was set at the heart of the earthly paradise, and the bread of life at the heart of your Church: may we who have been nourished at your table on earth be transformed by the glory of the Saviour's cross and enjoy the delights of eternity; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading

¹I looked, and there in heaven a door stood open! And the first voice, which I had heard speaking to me like a trumpet, said, 'Come up here, and I will show you what must take place after this.' ²At once I was in the spirit, and there in heaven stood a throne, with one seated on the throne! ³And the one seated there looks like jasper and cornelian, and around the throne is a rainbow that looks like an emerald. ⁴Around the throne are twenty-four thrones, and seated on the thrones are twenty-four elders, dressed in white robes, with golden crowns on their heads. ⁵Coming from the throne are flashes of lightning, and rumblings and peals of thunder, and in front of the throne there is something like a sea of glass, like crystal. Around the throne, and on each side of the throne, are four living creatures, full of eyes in front and behind: ⁷the first living creature like a lion, the second living creature like a flying eagle. ⁸And the four living creatures, each of them with six wings, are full of eyes all around and inside. Day and night without ceasing they sing,

'Holy, holy, holy, the Lord God the Almighty, who was and is and is to come.'

⁹And whenever the living creatures give glory and honour and thanks to the one who is seated on the throne, who lives for ever and ever, ¹⁰the twenty-four elders fall before the one who is seated on the throne and worship the one who lives for ever and ever; they cast their crowns before the throne, singing, ¹¹'You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honour and power, for you created all things, and by your will they existed and were created

²²One day Jesus got into a boat with his disciples, and he said to them, 'Let us go across to the other side of the lake.' So they put out, ²³and while they were sailing he fell asleep. A gale swept down on the lake, and the boat was filling with water, and they were in danger. ²⁴They went to him and woke him up, shouting, 'Master, Master, we are perishing!' And he woke up and rebuked the wind and the raging waves; they ceased, and there was a calm. ²⁵He said to them, 'Where is your faith?' They were afraid and amazed, and said to one another, 'Who then is this, that he commands even the winds and the water, and they obey him?'



Thought for the week:

As this photo shows, the Sea of Galilee can be pretty bleak at times. Some of us who have visited have experienced a choppy crossing and can identify with Jesus' disciples, terrified by the sudden gale in this week's gospel reading.



Luke 8. 22-25

Sudden storms were not unusual so this one must have been quite fierce to terrify experienced sailors on that sea. Maybe they were a bit cross also that Jesus seemed to be able to sleep through it. At their cries (and perhaps arm tugging) he woke and dealt with the problem.

It is a bit corny to state, but isn't life like that for us too. We are sailing blithely through life and then some terrible storm brews which really gets to us – something perhaps unsettling, a bereavement, loss of job or relationship, a challenge or decision that just seems too much to bear. AND it feels as if God is silent, unaware of our need and despair.

That is when we too need to tug at God's metaphorical sleeve and cry out in prayer. God may not take away the problem as he did on the Sea of Galilee, but God can certainly quell the storm going on inside each of us and make it more bearable.

We might try that next time a storm brews up in our lives.

Please pray about whether you are being called to stand for one of the places on the PCC: we have three places for 3 years and 2 for 2 years, plus a one year Deanery Synod place.

From the PCC / Standing Committee

Highlights of the recent meetings, FYI:

- The eco group was congratulated on achieving the Silver award
- Plans for a path round part of the church are with the DAC, seeking approval (funded by a legacy and CoOp Community Fund grant)
- We have a small regular cleaning team
- Our MAP (mission Action Plan) was further updated to include ways of becoming more financially viable on a day to day basis
- The Prayers of Love and Faith (for same sex couples in church) would probably reach General Synod in July. As an Inclusive church the PCC affirmed support.
- Financial statements for 2024 were approved (and Bev and Dave thanked for their hard work on them)
- The main charities in 2024 had been:
 - Embrace the Middle East; Green Christians. Foodshare, with also: Kori, Inclusive Church and New Brainstorm school in Uganda
- Key charities for 2025-7 were agreed as
 - Embrace the Middle East; Christians Against Poverty; The Baby Bank
- It was agreed that the chapel should be re-carpeted, using a gift for this purpose
- The impact of Ministry Team members leaving / away from post was discussed
- An in-house Basic Safeguarding training would be provided for all who need to do it
- Theology week had taken place at St. Luke's school and been amazing.

Basic Safeguarding Training

A number of people are required to do the Church of England Basic Safeguarding course (e.g. welcomers, pastoral team...). To make that easier Barbara and Revd. Sally will lead a session on this course after church on Sunday 16th March. It will not take long but will fulfil our legal requirements and it will be good to do the course together. You will be notified if you must do this but it is open to anyone at all.
