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### Week Commencing: 26th January, Third Sunday of Epiphany

This Sunday we have a Service of Parish Communion at 10am when there will be activities for children. Everyone is very warmly invited to worship with us.

#### **The Collect**

Almighty God, whose Son revealed in signs and miracles the wonder of your saving presence: renew your people with your heavenly grace, and in all our weakness sustain us by your mighty power; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

#### **Post Communion Prayer**

Almighty Father,
whose Son our Saviour Jesus Christ
is the light of the world:
may your people,
illumined by your word and sacraments,
shine with the radiance of his glory,
that he may be known, worshipped, and
obeyed to the ends of the earth;
for he is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

### **First Reading**

12 Just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. 13For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body - Jews or Greeks, slaves or free – and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. 14Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. 15 If the foot would say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body, 'that would not make it any less a part of the body. 16 And if the ear would say, 'Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body,' that would not make it any less a part of the body. 17 If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? 18But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. 19If all were a single member, where would the body be? 20As it is, there are many members, yet one body. 21The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you,' nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' 22 On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, 23 and those members of the body that we think less honourable we clothe with greater honour, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; 24whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honour to the inferior member, 25that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. 26 If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it. 27Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. 28And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. 29Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? 30Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? 31But strive for the greater gifts.

### Gospel Reading 33

<sub>14</sub>Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. <sub>15</sub>He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

 $_{16}$ When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read,  $_{17}$ and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

<sub>18</sub>'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, <sub>19</sub>to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.'

<sub>20</sub>And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. <sub>21</sub>Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.'

### Thought for the week:

In this week's gospel reading Jesus begins in his ministry, chosen to read from the scrolls in the synagogue at Nazareth, his hometown. All spoke well of him but read on the rest of the passage, not set for this week, and we see that Jesus did



not enjoy the adulation but challenged the men of Nazareth for their insularity.

When Jesus told them that Isaiah's prophecy of healing and redemption was fulfilled he meant that it was for all people, not just a special group of Hebrew people who had become so insular, so self-obsessed that they looked down on the Gentiles around them as unclean. Jesus reminded them of other stories in their past which even then had shown God's care for 'the other' – the widow whom Elijah helped was a Gentile, as was Naaman the Syrian, cleansed from leprosy by God.

The men of Nazareth were furious because they were no longer special and exclusive. Their holy bubble has been burst by Jesus' radical way of interpreting and teaching, of proclaiming the true kingdom of God.

At the very start of his work Jesus makes it clear to whom he has come and to whom the Kingdom of God is open. His teaching will turn the world upside down. His final action in dying will change the course of history. And Luke emphasises that this is possible through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit – made fully clear from Jesus' baptism onwards.

What of us? Are we like those early Nazarenes? Exclusive? Keeping the gospel, the good news, God, to ourselves? Are we willing to place ourselves alongside Jesus? In the firing line, upsetting the apple cart, but opening up the life and hope and joy and peace and healing and wholeness of God to absolutely all people?

That is a tough ask, but as Jesus was filled with the power of God's Spirit from his baptism – so too are we.
