The Collect

Lord, you have taught us
that all our doings without love are nothing worth:
send your Holy Spirit
and pour into our hearts
that most excellent gift of love,
the true bond of peace and of all virtues,
without which whoever lives
is counted dead before you.
Grant this for your only Son Jesus Christ's sake,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

The Post Communion Prayer

Loving Father,
we thank you for feeding us
at the supper of your Son:
sustain us with your Spirit,
that we may serve you here on earth
until our joy is complete in heaven,
and we share in the eternal banquet
with Jesus Christ our Lord..

A reading from Paul's letter to the Galatians

1 For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

13 For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. 14 For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' 15 If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

16 Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. 17 For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. 18 But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. 19 Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, 20 idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, 21 envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

22 By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, 23 gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. 24 And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. 25 If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

Galatians 5. 1, 13-25

The Gospel reading

51 When the days drew near for him to be taken up, Jesus set his face to go to Jerusalem. 52 And he sent messengers ahead of him. On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to make ready for him; 53 but they did not receive him, because his face was set towards Jerusalem. 54 When his disciples James and John saw it, they said, 'Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?' 55 But he turned and rebuked them. 56 Then they went on to another village.

57 As they were going along the road, someone said to him, 'I will follow you wherever you go.' 58 And Jesus said to him, 'Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head.' 59 To another Jesus said, 'Follow me.' But he said, 'Lord, first let me go and bury my father.' 60 But Jesus said to him, 'Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God.' 61 Another said, 'I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home.' 62 Jesus said to him, 'No one who puts a hand to the plough and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God.'

Thought for the week:

Local artist Stanley Spencer painted this picture, 'The Foxes have holes' as one of his 'Wilderness' series of paintings, usually associated with Lent. We hear the reading above during ordinary time, but there is a Lenten hint to it as both readings today remind us of the cost of being a disciple of Jesus.

As far as we know, once Jesus grew up and left Nazareth, he had no permanent home of his own. His three years of ministry were itinerant and without the stability of home comforts. Jesus had high expectations for himself – and for those who followed him – trusting in God to provide for everyday needs and learning to live simply.

St. Paul, in his letter to the early church in the Galatian region, was also very aware of the need for Christian disciple to live by high standards, especially compared to the world at large.

It would be easy today to dismiss these teachings as outdated or irrelevant, but perhaps we might learn from them about a simplicity of living and a manner of being with others that speaks of a best way of life for all people.

On a visit to Israel a few years ago I was sitting along by the Sea of Galilee and taken by the holes in the rock beside me, then I saw the creature which lived there (a hyrax) and thought of Jesus' teaching – perhaps were his 'foxes'. Whilst not aspiring to live in a hole, learning to trust more in God and living closer to nature had an attraction that can easily be lost and subsumed in the pressure of everyday life. Perhaps I should re-engage with it.
