This weekend we move into Passiontide and the last two weeks of Jesus' life. Our 10 am service on Sunday is a Parish Communion service, and at 6pm we are invited to All Saints church to walk the Stations of the Cross.

The Collect

Readings for Sunday

First reading A Reading from Ezekiel

1The hand of the LORD came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the LORD and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. 2He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. 3He said to me, 'Mortal, can these bones live?' I answered, 'O Lord GOD, you know.' 4Then he said to me, 'Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the LORD. 5Thus says the Lord GOD to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. 6I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the LORD.'

7So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. 8I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. 9Then he said to me, 'Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord GOD: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live.' 10I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude.

11Then he said to me, 'Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, "Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely." 12Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord GOD: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. 13And you shall know that I am the LORD, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. 14I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the LORD, have spoken and will act, says the LORD.'

The Gospel reading

A certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. 2Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. 3So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, 'Lord, he whom you love is ill.' 4But when Jesus heard it, he said, 'This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it.' 5Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, 6after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was. 7Then after this he said to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judea again.' 8The disciples said to him, 'Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?' 9Jesus answered, 'Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble, because they see the light of this world. 10But those who walk at night stumble, because the light is not in them.' 11After saying this, he told them, 'Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him.' 12The disciples said to him, 'Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right.' 13Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. 14Then Jesus told them plainly, 'Lazarus is dead. 15For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him.' 16Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellowdisciples, 'Let us also go, that we may die with him.'

17When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. 18Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, 19and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. 20When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. 21Martha said to Jesus, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. 22But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him.' 23Jesus said to her, 'Your brother will rise again.' 24Martha said to him, 'I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day.' 25Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, 26and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?' 27She said to him, 'Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world.'

28When she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary, and told her privately, 'The Teacher is here and is calling for you.' 29And when she heard it, she got up quickly and went to him. 30Now Jesus had not yet come to the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. 31The Jews who were with her in the house, consoling her, saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb to weep there. 32When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.' 33When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. 34He said, 'Where have you laid him?' They said to him, 'Lord, come and see.' 35Jesus began to weep. 36So the Jews said, 'See how he loved him!' 37But some of them said, 'Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?'

38Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. 39Jesus said, 'Take away the stone.' Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, 'Lord, already

there is a stench because he has been dead four days.' 40Jesus said to her, 'Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?' 41So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upwards and said, 'Father, I thank you for having heard me. 42I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me.' 43When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come out!' 44The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, and let him go.'

45Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him.



Thought for the week



The (long, but) beautiful story in today's gospel is the turning point in John's account of the lead-up to the passion and death of Jesus. As a result of Jesus raising Lazarus from death, the Jewish leaders seek to have him put to death himself. He has gone too far for them, and will cause upset with the Roman occupiers, 'one man must die for the nation' (to prevent discord), they say – how true, though not as they mean it.

For Jesus, this story is one of love and compassion before his actual passion. We see him weeping at the loss of his friend, before he brings Lazarus back to life.

The lovely mosaic to the left is in the church found in Bethany today at the site of Lazarus' tomb. It must have been both terrifying for those who witnessed it – and perhaps a little unsavoury too – notice the man on the right holding his nose! – and also an awesome and

amazing demonstration of Jesus' power from his father.

that restricts and prevents us from trusting in his eternal promises.

The incident also raises many questions – why does God not save everyone who dies 'too soon' - then and today? There are no easy answers to why a loving God does not do this. We should remember that Jesus only raised a few people to life – a widow's son, a little girl, Lazarus. The incident revolves around important teaching by Jesus. He says to Martha: 'I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and

there is eternal life for those who trust in him and in his saving death and resurrection. That can offer us hope and comfort as today we mourn our 'lost' loved ones, and as we look to our

believes in me will never die'. Jesus (and the evangelist John) uses this opportunity to teach that

own demise. In the mosaic picture Lazarus emerges from the tomb bound in the traditional fashion. As Jesus commands the bystanders to 'unbind him', perhaps we might also invite Jesus to unbind us from all

From the PCC

Key issues discussed at the most recent PCC meeting include:

- Our three main charities for 2022 had each received £1300 as the main part of out outward giving: Tear Fund (Ukraine support), A Rocha (Climate support) Brett Foundation (Fuel poverty). Members were asked to consider which three charities we should support this year.
- The laminated notices in pews about how to give to the church were noted.
- The Eco day had been a great success- now for action!
- The Annual Report and Accounts for 2022 were approved and to be sent for inspection
- The number of places vacant for election at the APCM is 9 (including three deanery synod reps)
- Further work is needed on the boiler and spare parts are to be purchased before they become
 obsolete so that we can keep it going while working on long term plan
- A group will be established to work on the development of the churchyard as a pleasant space
- We have no applications yet for the Director of Music or Children and Family Leader post (this latter may be supported through a scholarship programme) but two candidates would be interviewed for the assistant Admin post.
- The replacement of the lights with LED lights, funded by J. Raffan's legacy, was approved
- A varied nurture programme was proposed (to start after Easter)
- Safeguarding risk assessments were reviewed.
- Policies reviewed and approved were: Social Media Policy
 - Baptism Policy
 - o Recruitment of Ex-offenders Policy
 - Pastoral Ministry Policy
 - Health and Safety Policy
 - Safeguarding Policy.
