The Collect

Merciful God, you have prepared for those who love you such good things as pass our understanding: pour into our hearts such love toward you that we, loving you in all things and above all things, may obtain your promises, which exceed all that we can desire; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Post Communion Prayer

God of our pilgrimage, you have led us to the living water: refresh and sustain us as we go forward on our journey, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading

Brothers and sisters, 6as you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving.

8See to it that no one takes you captive through philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the universe, and not according to Christ. 9For in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, 10and you have come to fullness in him, who is the head of every ruler and authority. 11In him also you were circumcised with a spiritual circumcision, by putting off the body of the flesh in the circumcision of Christ; 12when you were buried with him in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead. 13And when you were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive together with him, when he forgave us all our trespasses, 14erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the cross. 15He disarmed the rulers and authorities and made a public example of them, triumphing over them in it.

Colossians 2. 6-15

Gospel Reading

1Jesus was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, 'Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples.' 2He said to them, 'When you pray, say:

Father, hallowed be your name.

Your kingdom come.

3Give us each day our daily bread.

4And forgive us our sins,

for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us.

And do not bring us to the time of trial.'

5And he said to them, 'Suppose one of you has a friend, and you go to him at midnight and say to him, "Friend, lend me three loaves of bread; 6for a friend of mine has arrived, and I have nothing to set before him." 7And he answers from within, "Do not bother me; the door has already been locked, and my children are with me in bed; I cannot get up and give you anything." 8I tell you, even though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, at least because of his persistence he will get up and give him whatever he needs.

9So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. 10For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. 11Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for a fish, will give a snake instead of a fish? 12Or if the child asks for an egg, will give a scorpion? 13If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!'

Thought for the week:

The gospel for Sunday is all about prayer.

Prayer – at the root and heart of our Christian lives.

Following teaching that we now call The Lord's Prayer, Jesus teaches that persistence in prayer is important. In that time people lived in one room with two levels and they all slept together. It was cosy and tight — one moved and all moved. Each family baked sufficient bread for one day at a time. So if you had a late-night visitor — wisely travelling in the cool of the day — who asked for bread and you have run out — you'd go and try to knock up a friend so that you could offer hospitality, that was culturally important. In Jesus's parable the friend not willing to disturb



the whole family – but Jesus' hearers would understand the need for persistence – you must offer hospitality.

So, Jesus teaches, prayer must also be persistent. Not badgering away at God so that God gives in, but the idea of not giving up with prayer.

Prayer is not coming to God once and then forgetting and leaving God to work 'magic'. It is about working with God and waiting on God. God doesn't NEED our prayer – God knows all and is all. But God LOVES our prayer as it is part of our relationship with God.

And, says Jesus, as we relate with God in prayer we need to trust also for the answer. God WILL answer prayer and in a way that is good and right for each individual. In the last part of the gospel

reading Jesus makes that clear. 'Ask seek knock' are also in the continuous tense – keep doing this and God will respond as a loving parent does with a child. Not just giving all they want and spoiling the child but caring deeply for the good of the child.

Too often I think we underestimate God and our prayer. We ask for little, it's as if we don't believe that God can or will honour God's promise to provide for our needs. And we use that as an excuse for not asking for enough. Of course, it is right not to be greedy – but God wants to bless people and we should allow God to shower on us the blessings God has and stop being so 'English' about it, as if to say: 'no, no, God, that's fine, this little bit of blessing is enough'.

So, in the coming weeks (that will turn into months) keep praying – God wants to bless this church – pray that you will each let God do so.
