Week commencing: 2nd April, Palm Sunday

Our main service this Sunday is **an All Age Holy Communion** at 10 am, which is both in- person and zoomed. We will be following the story of Jesus' passion using a child friendly version. Those of us who are able bodied will **process** from the vicarage into church with our palm crosses - do go to church first to collect books etc.

At 6pm, we are invited to the Church of the Good Shepherd, Cox Green, for a **Taize service** – this is in-person only.

As we move into Holy Week, everyone is warmly invited to join in our daily zoomed **Morning Prayer.** Details of the Holy Week services are later in this news sheet.

The **church will be open** for private prayer and quiet between 7.30 pm and 9 pm Monday – Thursday and anyone is welcome to drop in.

On **Maundy Thursday**, at our service of Holy Communion, we will be offering hand or foot washing for any who wish for this. You may prefer to bring your own hand towel for this service. we will also be offering the chalice for any who wish to receive from it – alongside the usual intincted wafers. Following the service, we are invited to keep watch in church until 11.45 when Compline will be said, and the church locked at midnight. You are welcome to come and go for the Watch, but please do not leave the service until the reading of the Gospel of the Watch is completed. There are Bible readings that can be read and meditated upon during the Watch and these are attached with this weekly sheet.

The Collect

Almighty and everlasting God, who in your tender love towards the human race sent your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ to take upon him our flesh and to suffer death upon the cross: grant that we may follow the example of his patience and humility, and also be made partakers of his resurrection; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion

Lord Jesus Christ,
you humbled yourself
in taking the form of a servant,
and in obedience died on the cross
for our salvation:
give us the mind to follow you
and to proclaim you as Lord and King,
to the glory of God the Father.

Readings for Sunday

A Reading from Paul's letter to the Philippians

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.

And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross.

Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. *Philippians 2.5-11*

The Palm Gospel

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, ²saying to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. ³If anyone says anything to you, just say this, "The Lord needs them." And he will send them immediately.' ⁴This took place to fulfil what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,

⁵ 'Tell the daughter of Zion,

Look, your king is coming to you,

humble, and mounted on a donkey,

and on a colt, the foal of a donkey.'

⁶The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; ⁷they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. ⁸A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. ⁹The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

'Hosanna to the Son of David!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!'

¹⁰When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, 'Who is this?' ¹¹The crowds were saying, 'This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee.' *Matthew 21. 1-10*

Thought for the week

We have had some groups of school children into church in the last couple of weeks, all exploring the story of Holy week and Easter. Using the technique, 'I wonder...' they have been encouraged to reflect and to ask questions. Some were very deep.

Thinking about Jesus' suffering, one boy asked, 'did it hurt Jesus, or did he get used to it?'

What a fabulous question from a nine year old! We cant know for sure, but if Jesus was fully human (as well as fully God) then surely he felt every lash of the whip, every jeer, every slap, the point of each thorn as it pierced his scalp; and every heaving breath on the cross will have been truly agony.



So why did he do it?

Why go through with what he could have escaped? He was, after all, also fully God.

Quite simply out of love.

It was love for each one of us that kept Jesus going through the agony of the cross and the 'terrible kiss of the nails'.

How many of us have wanted to take the place of a suffering loved one – out of our sheer love for them?

That is why Jesus suffered and died – he didn't get used to it but he endured it out of love for us, his beloved. We know the ending that his friends at the time did not – he rose again to open to us the absolute heart of God's love, for all eternity.

So, as we journey through another holy week, have we 'got used to it'? Has the keeping it, the rituals and readings, become old hat and so familiar that they wash over us?

We might do well to look on this Holy Week afresh with the eyes of a child and ask deep questions, and, most importantly, allow ourselves to be bathed in Jesus' gracious, wholly self-offered, love.

Prayer suggestions for this week:

- That we may enter fully into the keeping of Holy Week.
- For our church leaders at this time.
- For the people of Ukraine and Russia, and for the UN. For all world leaders.
- For all who are worried and struggling with the cost of living, for those who are hungry, or who eat alone every day.
- That we may embrace our ministry as an inclusive church, in every way.
- For our ministry with children and for our plans to appoint a Children and Family Leader.
- For a new Director of Music / organist.
- For our care for creation for our work towards becoming an Eco church.
