Gospel Reading

²³One sabbath Jesus was going through the cornfields; and as they made their way his disciples began to pluck heads of grain. ²⁴The Pharisees said to him, 'Look, why are they doing what is not lawful on the sabbath?' ²⁵And he said to them, 'Have you never read what David did when he and his companions were hungry and in need of food? ²⁶He entered the house of God, when Abiathar was high priest, and ate the bread of the Presence, which it is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and he gave some to his companions.' ²⁷Then he said to them, 'The sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the sabbath; ²⁸so the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath.'

¹Again he entered the synagogue, and a man was there who had a withered hand. ²They watched him to see whether he would cure him on the sabbath, so that they might accuse him. ³And he said to the man who had the withered hand, 'Come forward.' ⁴Then he said to them, 'Is it lawful to do good or to do harm on the sabbath, to save life or to kill?' But they were silent. ⁵He looked around at them with anger; he was grieved at their hardness of heart and said to the man, 'Stretch out your hand.' He stretched it out, and his hand was restored. ⁶The Pharisees went out and immediately conspired with the Herodians against him, how to destroy him. *Mark 2.23-3.6*

Thought for the week



The New Testament reading this week includes these words: 'God who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ ⁷But we have this treasure in clay jars...' (2 Cor. 4.6-7)

Ordinary clay pots are fragile, and when cracked or broken are discarded. But an ancient tradition in Japan – kintsugi – beautifully repairs broken ceramics that may not have any intrinsic or aesthetic value. Kintsugi sees the damage as an episode in the life of the object. The cracks are not concealed to render the joins invisible, but are highlighted by using a lacquer mixed with powdered gold or silver. The repaired vessels are highly valued even if they no longer have a functional use. Through these cracks light often shines, enhanced by the repair.

Human beings are often cracked or damaged by the stresses and vicissitudes of life. The light of the gospel can shine through damaged lives. And damaged and wounded lives can be healed, to God's glory, and God can work through the pain and problems.

On the last Wednesday of every month at St. Luke's we end our mid-week communion service by offering anointing for healing and wholeness, at which we receive oil for our own healing (in mind body and spirit) and we pray for others. The service ends with three simple responses:

God who said: 'Let light shine out of darkness' has caused his light to shine within us to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God revealed in the face of Jesus Christ.

We have this treasure in earthen vessels **to show that the power belongs to God.** How valuable it is in healing to remind ourselves that we are simple, fragile, clay pots, through which God's glory can shine – if we allow it.

Diocesan Synod elections From the Area Dean: The next triennium of Oxford Diocesan Synod begins on 1 August 2024. Maidenhead and Windsor is entitled to elect four lay members and I am acting as Returning Officer for the House of Laity. I am inviting anyone who would like to stand to complete the attached Nomination Form and return it to me at <u>ainsley.swift@gmail.com</u> by 4 June at the latest. Those elected will serve until 2027. Candidates will require a proposer and seconder who are existing members of the Deanery Synod. If you need a list of members' names one can be obtained by emailing <u>maidenhead.windsor.deanery@gmail.com</u>.

Membership is not restricted to members of the Deanery Synod, although it is they who are the electorate. PCC secretaries are requested to circulate this email to PCC members and other members of their electoral roll. A lay person is qualified for election by the House of Laity of a Deanery Synod as a member of the Diocesan Synod if the person is an actual communicant aged 16 or over. In the event of more nominations than places, an election will be held, with the result to be announced by 9 July.

Parish data:

The Diocesan Secretary has sent the following information, which may be of interest: The recent publication of data from the 2021 Census provides us with a valuable opportunity to reflect on our mission priorities, particularly with regard to children, young people, those from Black and Minority Ethnic backgrounds, and those of other faiths, in our parishes.

I am pleased to say that the latest census data has now been mapped onto parish boundaries, and our part-time data analyst, Dr Bev Botting, has captured this in user-friendly dashboards.

One dashboard is available for every parish. They can be found on the <u>Research and Insight section of</u> <u>the website</u>. We have placed them there so that they can be accessed by anyone within the parish, and so that you can make any comparisons with other parishes that may be helpful in your reflections on them. They draw only on information provided by the public in completing the census, mapped onto parish boundaries.

On that webpage there is also a link to the parish dashboards produced by the Church of England nationally, drawing on the Statistics for Mission and Return of Parish Finance data parishes kindly provide. After a gap during the Covid years, these have been produced once again, with data up to 2022. If you wish to see your 2023 data, please ask whoever enters the data onto the Parish Returns website to download it once they have entered the 2023 data.

By its nature, the information from the national census is only refreshed every ten years. It provides an invaluable source of information on who is living within your parish, including the numbers of children and young people, and ethnicity.

How does your congregation compare with the profile given in this data for your parish? If there is a material difference, what might God be calling your parish to do in response?
