Gospel Reading

²⁴When the crowd saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were at the place where Jesus had given the bread, they themselves got into the boats and went to Capernaum looking for Jesus.

²⁵When they found him on the other side of the lake, they said to him, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?' ²⁶Jesus answered them, 'Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. ²⁷Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal.' ²⁸Then they said to him, 'What must we do to perform the works of God?' ²⁹Jesus answered them, 'This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent.' ³⁰So they said to him, 'What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? Gospel Reading

How can he now say, "I have come down from heaven"?' ⁴³Jesus answered them, 'Do not complain among yourselves. ⁴⁴No one can come to me unless drawn by the Father who sent me; and I will raise that person up on the last day. ⁴⁵It is written in the prophets, "And they shall all be taught by God." Everyone who has heard and learned from the Father comes to me. ⁴⁶Not that anyone has seen the Father except the one who is from God; he has seen the Father. ⁴⁷Very truly, I tell you, whoever believes has eternal life. ⁴⁸I am the bread of life. ⁴⁹Your ancestors ate the manna in the

Thought for the weeks...

You can't beat a sandwich – it is the British staple – it is good wholesome comfort food. Unless we are allergic in some way, we really need bread to keep us going.



Jesus reminds his followers of that when he comes out with that most remarkable statement in the gospel reading: I am the bread of life, he says. Those listening know that people need bread to live. The Hebrew for bread, *lehem*, literally means food – the means of life. But Jesus takes it further – beyond the literal - by saying that in fact actual bread / food is not enough. People need Jesus himself in order to live for eternity and to have the fullness of life that he promises a little later in the gospel. He deliberately plays on the literal meaning: I am the bread of life – whoever comes to me will never be hungry and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

Some of those who hear are both confused and offended. They know this man. He is a tradesman – the son of Joseph and Mary. They have seen him grow up and are not happy with the claims he is making – how can he have come down from heaven? He is a pretender, making huge claims for himself. He is just a man, and an offensive one at that. Cannibalism was against the law and distasteful. He was talking rubbish.

But Jesus explained to them that he was talking on a different level to their understanding. They knew that they needed bread to live, everyone did. But everyone also died ultimately – look at their ancestors who had eaten the special heavenly bread during the wilderness wanderings – the Manna. They had still died. What Jesus was now talking about was eternal life – life for ever with God, a resurrection once this earthly life was over – starting in this life. I imagine this must have been confusing for his hearers then but of course we have the whole picture and we know that Jesus died to offer his body in order that people might have eternal life.

So in our lives we need Jesus himself, as well as ordinary food and better than any sandwich!
