Week Commencing: 6th April, Passion Sunday

This Sunday we have a service of Parish Communion at 10am. Everyone is warmly invited to worship with us. At 6pm we are invited to All Saints church to follow the Stations of the Cross. We have our last Lent lunch at midday this Sunday, do join us. There will be an opportunity on Sunday to give a donation for those caught in the Myanmar earthquake.

The Collect

Most merciful God, who by the death and resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ delivered and saved the world: grant that by faith in him who suffered on the cross we may triumph in the power of his victory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion Prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, you have taught us that what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters we do also for you: give us the will to be the servant of others as you were the servant of all, and gave up your life and died for us, but are alive and reign, now and for ever

First Reading

¹⁶Thus says the LORD, who makes a way in the sea, a path in the mighty waters, ¹⁷who brings out chariot and horse, army and warrior; they lie down, they cannot rise, they are extinguished, quenched like a wick:¹⁸Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. ¹⁹I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.

²⁰The wild animals will honour me, the jackals and the ostriches; for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people, ²¹the people whom I formed for myself so that they might declare my praise. *Isaiah 43. 16-21*

Gospel Reading

¹Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. ²There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. ³Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. ⁴But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, ⁵'Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?' ⁶(He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) ⁷Jesus said, 'Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. ⁸You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me.' *John 12. 1-8*

Thought for the week:

The window next to the prayer candle area in our north aisle tells the story of Mary meeting the resurrected Jesus in a garden.

Around the window you can see images of the passionflower. As we move into Passiontide (the last, and holiest part of Lent) we are reminded of the immense suffering of Jesus. Over the next two weeks we will recall how the crowds who cheered him on Palm Sunday were baying for his death five days later, stirred up by the jealousy of the religious leaders of the day. We will hear again how he was abandoned by almost all his friends, betrayed into the hand of the soldiers by one of them, mocked, beaten and humiliated and finally put to death in the most barbaric way – suffocation on a cross.

In a whole variety of ways the art world helps us to just begin to grasp thus utter devastation – through classical and contemporary art, music and sculpture. And the world of nature can help us to remember too, in a more subtle way.

The passionflower is said to symbolise the events of Jesus' passion. The purple flowers are the liturgical colour used in Lent, and the bloom's 10 petal-like parts represent Jesus' disciples (excluding deniers Peter and Judas), the five stamens signify Jesus' wounds, the knob-like stigmas suggest the nails, and the fringed ring resembles the crown of thorns. The fruit represents our world that Jesus saved when he sacrificed himself. This came to prominence in Victorian times, when our church was built, hence its inclusion in the window.

You may like to spend some time looking at the window and reflecting on what is says to you of Jesus' love, focussing on both his passion – and resurrection.

From the recent PCC meeting:

A summary if the key points raised at the meeting on 18th March:

- Officers were elected:
 - Vice Chair Clare Price
 - Treasurer Bev Botting
 - Secretary Smita Bora (not a PCC member)
 - Chair of Fabric Ralph Hinchliffe
 - Health and Safety Officer Ralph Hinchliffe
 - Parish Safeguarding Officer Barbara Essam (not a PCC member)

- Electoral Roll Officer Ruth (ie Parish Administrator)
- Net Zero Ctte Chair Clare Price
- Standing cttee reps: Kim Rumble and Ralph Hinchliffe
- The DAC had given approval for the proposed faculty application for the resin-bound gravel path. The faculty notice is now on the public PCC noticeboard for 28 days (starting 12th March) and advice about whether LA planning permission is required is being sought.
- Concern for finance has ben added to our Mission Action Plan.
- The replacement of the carpet in the chapel (for which we have donated funding) was approved.
- The three main charities for the year were agreed:
 - Baby Bank as this year's local charity with Fiona Leonard as champion.
 - o Christians Against Poverty as this year's national charity with James Ellins as champion
 - Embrace the Middle East as this year's international charity with Barbara Essam as champion
- We are paying parish share in full (a little lower this year than last) but expenditure still exceeds income and this must be addressed.
- With no one standing to fill the vacant one-year place on Deanery Synod, the churchwardens would attend this year along with the two other reps. (particularly in Revd. Sally's absence).
- The procedure for the vacancy was outlined (details to come in the weekly sheet after Easter). The Area Parish Development Officer (Rhodri Bowen) would join the PCC planning morning on 26th April.
- All church and non church activities were authorised for the Safeguarding Hub.
- Two policies were reviewed and approved: Safeguarding, Children and Holy Communion.
- The SIAMS inspection had taken place at St. Luke's school with a very favourable outcome (church school inspection); Jamie Harle had become a governor there.
- It is hoped that Bishop Mary will speak at the next Deanery Synod in May.
