The Collect

Almighty God, you have broken the tyranny of sin and have sent the Spirit of your Son into our hearts whereby we call you Father: give us grace to dedicate our freedom to your service, that we and all creation may be brought to the glorious liberty of the children of God; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion Prayer O God, whose beauty is beyond our imagining and whose power we cannot comprehend: show us your glory as far as we can grasp it

show us your glory as far as we can grasp it, and shield us from knowing more than we can bear until we may look upon you without fear; through Jesus Christ our Saviour

Gospel Reading

¹The Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. ²He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. ³Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. ⁴Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. ⁵Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this house!" ⁶And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. ⁷Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. ⁸Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; ⁹cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you." ¹⁰But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, ¹¹"Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near."

¹⁶Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever rejects you rejects me, and whoever rejects me rejects the one who sent me.'

¹⁷The seventy returned with joy, saying, 'Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!' ¹⁸He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. ¹⁹See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. ²⁰Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven. *Luke 10. 1-11, 16-20*

Thought for the week:

I found the image to the right on the web, when I browsed the web to find images for 'Jesus sends out the 70 disciples'. I can't find out who painted it, or any info about – but I love it!

This painting speaks to me of haste, of movement, of colour and chaos and excitement. It sums up the 'mission of the 72' so well.

We usually read this passage from Luke on our feast day (18th October) and so we know it quite well.

We are one in the Spirit Shine Jesus shine



In it, Jesus sends 'seventy others' to prepare people for his visiting ministry, and to share in it with him. They were warned that there were few of them but many more people to minister to. They were sent with few resources, but in pairs, to share the load, and were to bring blessing and peace wherever they went.

That word 'others' is so important. Elsewhere Jesus says, 'whoever is not against me is for me'. We are reminded that ministry is shared between many people, all different and each with different ways of ministering. Yet each, when done in Jesus' name, equally valid.

In an Inclusive church like ours, everyone has a part to play. Ministry should be colourful, exciting and vibrant just like this picture. Ministry is about cleaning the church, making the coffee, delivering invitations and tending the garden, as well as leading worship and study (for which there are trained leaders).

My prayer for this church as you enter an interregnum is that it will be so. Everyone playing their part – always in the name of Jesus, and always working together, always looking to the leadership (and authority) of your churchwardens Clare and Jacqueline, and your ministers, Terrie and Jamie, and return in November from maternity leave, Sam.

'Whoever listen to you, listens to me', said Jesus – words that are both affirming and challenging to all of us, as we ensure we are always ministering in His name.
