The Collect

God, who in generous mercy sent the Holy Spirit upon your Church in the burning fire of your love: grant that your people may be fervent in the fellowship of the gospel that, always abiding in you, they may be found steadfast in faith and active in service; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever

Post Communion Prayer

Keep, O Lord, your Church, with your perpetual mercy; and, because without you our human frailty cannot but fall, keep us ever by your help from all things hurtful, and lead us to all things profitable to our salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading

¹My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favouritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? ²For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, ³ and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, 'Have a seat here, please,' while to the one who is poor you say, 'Stand there,' or, 'Sit at my feet,' 4have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? 5 Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? ⁶But you have dishonoured the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? 7 Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? ⁸You do well if you really fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' 9But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. ¹⁰For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. ¹¹For the one who said, 'You shall not commit adultery,' also said, 'You shall not murder.' Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. ¹²So speak and so act as those who are to be judged by the law of liberty. ¹³For judgement will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgement. ¹⁴What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? ¹⁵If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, ¹⁶and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill,' and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? ¹⁷So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead. James 2.1-10, 14-17

Gospel Reading

²⁴Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, ²⁵but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. ²⁶Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. ²⁷He said to her, 'Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' ²⁸But she answered him, 'Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs.' ²⁹Then he said to her, 'For saying that, you may go – the demon has left your daughter.' 30 So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone. ³¹Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. ³²They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. ³³He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. ³⁴Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' 35And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. ³⁶Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. ³⁷They were astounded beyond measure, saying, 'He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to Mark 7.24-37 speak.'

The Thanksgiving service for the life of Phyllis Sigsworth, RIP, will be held in church on Sunday 8th September at 2pm. All are warmly invited to give thanks for this amazing lady, who played a key role in the life of our church family for so many years.

All Saints Church, Boyne Hill will also be taking part in the Heritage weekend. See below for more details.

All Saints church in Boyne Hill will be open under this scheme on 14 and 15 September for you to visit, between 9.30 and 4.30 on the Saturday, and between 12 and 4.30 on the Sunday. This is a grade 1 listed church built in the gothic style to reflect the mediaeval grandeur of the cathedrals and churches of that time and is full of polychromatic colour, beautiful windows, stone carvings and much more. And there is not just the church to see - it is sited in an enclosed grass quadrangle with other buildings around it in the same style, and with an interesting churchyard. It is of national and international significance.

Detailed leaflets will be available for you to browse around the church at any time at your own pace with volunteers on hand to answer questions, and there will be a guided tour at 10.30am on the Saturday and 3pm on the Sunday, and an organ recital at 2.30 on the Sunday. Light refreshments will also be available.

Our next church breakfast is on **Saturday 21st September** when, in a change of speaker, Revd. Sally will unpack some of the mystery of the Church of England, and (attempt to) answer all those questions that you have always wated to ask about it!. Doors open 8.45 am and tickets at £5 each will be available soon.

Sunday 22nd September, the annual Johanna Raffan Memorial Lecture. We are alternating recitals and lectures by young people in memory of Johanna. This year will be a lecture at 1pm that day by scientist Matthew Price, who grew up through this church and sang in our choir. Do book the date to come along, just turn up.


