Week Commencing: 9th March, the First Sunday of Lent

This Sunday we have a service of Holy Communion at 8am and a service of Parish Communion at 10am. Everyone is very warmly invited to worship with us. There will be an activity for children at 10 am. At midday we have our first Lent Lunch (soup, bread and cheese) with donations to Christian Aid. All are welcome.

The Collect

Almighty God, whose Son Jesus Christ fasted forty days in the wilderness, and was tempted as we are, yet without sin: give us grace to discipline ourselves in obedience to your Spirit; and, as you know our weakness, so may we know your power to save; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion Prayer

Lord God,
you have renewed us
with the living bread from heaven;
by it you nourish our faith,
increase our hope,
and strengthen our love:
teach us always to hunger
for him who is the true and living bread,
and enable us to live by every word
that proceeds from out of your mouth;
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading

Moses spoke to the people, saying: 1When you have come into the land that the LORD your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, ²you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the LORD your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the LORD your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. ³You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the LORD your God that I have come into the land that the LORD swore to our ancestors to give us.' 4When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the LORD your God, ⁵you shall make this response before the LORD your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. ⁶When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us, ⁷we cried to the LORD, the God of our ancestors; the LORD heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. 8The LORD brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; ⁹and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. ¹⁰So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O LORD, have given me.' You shall set it down before the LORD your God and bow down before the LORD your God. ¹¹Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the LORD your God has given to you and to your house. Deuteronomy 26. 1-11

Gospel Reading

¹Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, ²where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. ³The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' ⁴Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone."'

⁵Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. ⁶And the devil said to him, 'To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. ⁷If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours.' ⁸Jesus answered him, 'It is written,

"Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him."

⁹Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, ¹⁰for it is written,

"He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you",

¹¹and "On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone."

¹²Jesus answered him, 'It is said, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." ¹³When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time. Luke 4. 1-13

Thought for the week:

In Sunday's gospel Jesus is wrestling with both theology and practicality. He has to work out for himself how, in the middle of the reality of everyday life, he is going to bring God to his people. What sort of Messiah will he be? How will he display God's power and might? To what is God calling him?



In the desert, at the start of his ministry, Jesus was face to face with the material realities of life – or rather, the lack of them.

Each of the three temptations as Luke records them focuses on a different aspect of human need. Food is a basic need and after 40 days of fasting Jesus would have been starving. Acceptance by others, adulation even, matters to most of us. Jesus could have world wide acclaim if he played his cards right. Safety is crucial to our survival. A display of God's power to save in a set up performance-jump off a high profile place would be impressive and haul in the crowds. But, as Rowan Williams writes,' all the temptations of Jesus seem to be about resorting to magic, instead of working with the fabric of the real world'. Jesus lived in a real, material world. So do we.

Jesus came through his desert experience with flying colours (well, he was God!) and he countered all the physical, material temptations with scripture and a deeper spiritual response. Humans don't simply live on bread / food, we need the Word of God to sustain us and nourish us, to guide us and help us. Great public demonstrations of personal prowess and power lead to egotism and dictatorship – we have seen the consequences of that throughout history- and we see it even now. Worship of God alone brings good and peace for all people

Through the very real material and physical temptations of the desert, Jesus realised the deeper

spiritual need which underpins all of life. His ministry was based not on power and might, but on humbly meeting people's deepest spiritual needs through prayer, forgiveness and friendship. Yes, there were miracles, but they were always done in love for the recipients and they are far fewer than the accounts we have of the everyday contacts with people in their ordinary lives – affirming their humanity and their worth but being a friend to them – as well as challenging others who abused their positions for their own power and comfort at the expense of others.

Out of his desert experience Jesus taught, modelled and affirmed the value of every person – the aliens in the land and the people into whose race he was born. He encouraged a deeper spirituality – in the midst of humanity and everyday life. He models for us, a way that this Lent we might seek to follow more closely.
